

New Acquisitions

Just when you think he's exhausted his memorabilia collection, our own **Bob Scully** comes up with something new. This time it's a 1928 photo of the Baby Parade with the first Convention Hall in the background. **John Conway** brought in rake and shovel novelties from the Union Trust Company. They were probably used as promotional novelties. **Charlotte Mason** gave us about a dozen Baby Parade photos from the 75th Queen Oceania Pageant. These can be seen in the Baby Parade Book. **George Carlson, Jr.** sent us a collection of items including a vacation guide put out by the City of Wildwood in the 1940s, **Aldine Apartments** letterhead, and a brochure for Wildwood's first convention hall. The Aldine was situated on the northwest corner of Cedar and Pacific Avenues. It was owned by the **Gorelick** family and came down during the urban renewal program of the late 1960s.

Charles and Betty Jacques continue to send us photos of Morey's Piers and the Boardwalk, and a collection of Wildwood High School Warrior newspapers came to us from the Estate of James Seibert. We thank you all for thinking of the museum.



father, an Italian immigrant who may well have been Luigi." Mike said that "Pop" had financed the business, was the boss and demanded that everything was to be done exactly his way. They even drove their small van to the Philadelphia markets to obtain the best and freshest ingredients. The exception was good bread.

Jim said, "Sam Finocchairo, whose family owned the Marine Italian Bakery told me that Mike ordered the same number of rolls every day. When they were gone, that was it, and he sold out of them every day. Sam also said that Mike was his only customer who ordered the bread slightly under baked so that he could toast the rolls to perfection in his pizza oven just before making every sandwich. 


