The Tom Cat

"Do you remember a place called 'The Tom Cat' on West Rio Grande Avenue?" This was the question I posed in our last newsletter, and these are some of the responses:

All the way from California, Jerry Winberger wrote, "And who wouldn't remember the Tom Cat (or, as it was commonly referred to, 'The Cat')? I graduated in 1959 and at that time the Tom Cat was the center of activity for nearly everyone. Whether it was a football game, a basketball game, or the weekly dance at the Crest Pier. You could always count on the place filling up about 45 minutes to an hour after the event ended."

Don Grosse (WHS-1957) from Edgewater, Florida said "The Tom Cat wasn't just a teenage hang out. It was a way of life. We knew after every sporting event, the dances and the movies, we would end up there. I fell in love at least six times at the Tom Cat. Every time we got a new car, we would head for the Tom Cat to show it off. In my case, a '54 black Buick Roadmaster convertible. Two of the waitresses I remember most were Mrs. Moe (Marguerite Bixler) and Bobbi Grassi. Tommy Taylor, the owner was one of the guys. In 1957, our basketball team won South Jersev and Tommy treated us all to a trip to see a basketball game and a night on the town. I continued my association with the Tom Cat for many years after graduation and will always have those 'good old memories'.

From Cape May, Loy Ehlers wrote that "In November of 1954 Helen Hansen (WHS-1956) first met Loy Ehlers (CMHS 1956) at the Tom Cat after a game. They married after college and will celebrate their 49th wedding anniversary this November 25. The Tom Cat was the social center for all high school students after any school event. Everyone rushed there after a game to try and get a seat in one of the booths. They had the best hamburgers in town for a quarter. Adults went through the day for coffee breaks, lunch and to tease the owner, Mr. Tom Taylor. It was just about everybody's favorite place during the 1950s."

Bob Paterson from Wildwood Crest said. "Do I remember the TOM CAT! WOW, what a busy place that was in the 50s and 60s. We drove there every Friday and Saturday night in my '49 Chevy, stick shift, no radio, no ash tray and no carpeting on the floor. Talk about a stripped down car, that was it! But the Tom Cat was the place where everybody met and cruised up and down Pacific Avenue with stops at the Tom Cat to see friends. Great burgers, shakes, sodas and the best waitress was Betty Hill from Anglesea. How did she put up with all of us teenagers all those years? Glad to see the Tom Cat open again. Hope it's successful. It was a fun place with many memories for many people."

From Cape May, **Jim Monaghan** (WHS-1958) wrote, "I'm reminded of Yogi Berra's quote, 'nobody goes there anymore. It's too crowded'. Well, in the fifties, everybody went to the Tom Cat, and it was very crowded. Before we could drive, we'd walk all the way from North Wildwood and back again just to get a burger and fries. That the girls went there too, had nothing at all to do with it."

Fabulous 50's

When Wildwood celebrates "The Fabulous 50s weekend" in October, I am reminded of the summers of the 1950s when Wildwood hosted some of the most popular entertainment in the nation.

The following ad was taken from a 1958 local newspaper. This is just a sampling of the entertainers that came to our little island.

Names like Tony Bennett, Frankie Laine, Liberace and various singing groups made Wildwood the place to visit.
